




CONVENER, IIAS

Jacob Olupona is Professor of African Religious Traditions, and Professor of African and African American Studies at Harvard University, USA. Olupona is the Convener of the Ife Institute of Advanced Studies. He has authored and edited several books concerned with interpreting Nigerian and African religious traditions, including his book, City of 201 Gods: Ile-Ife in Time, Space and the Imagination (2011) which won the Harvard Cabot Fellowship Award. He was the 2019 recipient of the Martin E. Marty award for the Public Understanding of Religion. He was recently elected to the American Academy of Arts and Sciences. 
KEYNOTE SPEAKER

Neil Roos is a South African Social Historian and Professor of History at the University of Fort Hare, where he is also dean of the Faculty of Humanities and Social Sciences. Additionally, he is co-implementer of the South African Department of Higher Education and Training's national collaborative Future Professors Programme. He took his doctoral degree at the University of Bophuthatswana, one of the so-called "homeland" universities on South Africa's rural periphery. His research is animated by a focus on histories of everyday life in societies marked by great inequality. Unlike most social historians of South Africa, he is interested not so much in those who defied segregation and apartheid but rather in the history of beneficiaries and perpetrators. Over many years he has written

about the complex anatomy of white everyday life in modern South Africa, asking questions about accommodation, choice and docility, as well as racism, racial identity and racial violence. These are uncomfortable questions about unfashionable subjects, and they feature in his most recent book, Ordinary Whites in Apartheid Society: social histories of accommodation. 
Olutayo Charles Adesina is a Professor of History in the Department of History, University of Ibadan, Nigeria, and the current British Academy Global Professor of History affiliated with the Department of History, School of Arts, Languages and Cultures, University of Manchester, United Kingdom. A distinguished Fellow of the Nigerian Academy of Letters (FNAL), the apex organisation of humanistic scholars in Nigeria, Prof Adesina has taught for over three decades at the University of Ibadan, Nigeria. An alumnus of the Obafemi Awolowo University, Ile-Ife, Prof. Adesina's work was selected in 2024 as one of the eight proposals for the 2023/2024 British Academy Global Professorship Award. This was for his research proposal entitled 'The Town and Gown Interface: Ibadan and the Decolonisation
